Hopefully this year's sale will be as successful as 2008's was .


### Library security

**BOOK review**

**FOR WHOM THE BELL TOLLS - Ernest Hemingway**

*This is how you live a life in two days.* These words from Ernest Hemingway's classic "For Whom the Bell Tolls" declare themselves more strongly than all the others for me, standing out as something of an overview.

Focusing on a small group of people involved in the Spanish Civil War, the book takes wartime literature and makes it readable for even the mere mortals who tend to find such works unappealing. Hemingway's trademark mechanical language lends it both simplicity and emotion, strangely enough, foregoing flowery language but still allowing readers to feel the main character's every heartbeat. Its excessively narrowed focus, which fills an entire hardcover with the details and actions of few characters over the course of a plot that encompasses just four days' time, makes matters extremely personal. *There is only now,* says protagonist Robert Jordan, *and if now is only two days, then two days is your life and everything in it will be in proportion. This is how you live a life in two days.*

I've made the mistake before of trying to do justice to Hemingway's writing. He is an exceptional author, but he is also an American giant and one our young nation's few claims to literary fame. Therefore, I won't try to recreate any of our American author's magic, but instead simply say that "For Whom the Bell Tolls" is a book worth reading.


**Just Take My Heart**


**Long Lost**
