Recruiting Readers: Explore “Points of View” in Muslim Journeys Program at Pickford Community Library

The Pickford Community Library is hosting a new reading and discussion series entitled “Let’s Talk About It: Muslim Journeys” in March and April of 2014. We cordially invite you to attend. The series is designed to offer participants an opportunity to learn about the people, places, history, faith, and cultures of Muslims in the United States and around the world through scholarly discussions at the library.

Our library is one of 125 libraries and state humanities councils nationwide that are receiving grants to host this series, which is sponsored by the National Endowment for the Humanities and the American Library Association. We were chosen in partnership with the Michigan Humanities Council and the Public Libraries of Saginaw. The Muslim Journeys theme that we have selected to explore is “Points of View.” The discussions will be facilitated by our

Project Scholar, Jillena Rose, Professor of English at Lake Superior State University.

The five narratives in “Points of View” are a diverse sampling across geography, time, and culture. The voices they feature are not only those of Muslims, but also of non-Muslims reflecting on the experience of living in Muslim majority societies in all their diversity. Although in no way an exhaustive collection, these books—like Muslim-majority societies—do not offer one story, but tell many stories and represent some of the best in contemporary storytelling.

The program, which begins March 8, will feature a multi-media approach to intercultural understanding that will include movies, displays, Ah’lan Time (social hour), and special presentations along with the core book discussions.

All programs begin at 6:30 p.m. at Pickford Community Library and

the program schedule is as follows: March 8, *Prince Among Slaves* movie; March 11, book discussion of *Persepolis*; *The Story of a Childhood* by Marjane Satrapi; March 18, book discussion of *In the Country of Men* by Hisham Matar; March 25-29, Islamic Art (daily movies schedule to be announced); April 1, book discussion of *House of Stone* by Anthony Shadid; April 8, book discussion of *Broken Verses* by Kamila Shamsi; April 12, *Koran by Heart* movie; and April 15, book discussion of *Dreams of Trespass* by Fatima Mernissi.

CCHS Meets at Bayliss

The Chippewa County Historical Society annual meeting will be held at Bayliss Public Library on Wednesday, April 9, at 7 p.m.

Craig Wilson, Museum Historian for the Mackinac State Historic Parks, will speak about "The American Naval Expedition to Mackinac Island, 1814." On July 17, 1812, British and Canadian forces captured Mackinac Island in one of the first engagements of the War of 1812. Two years later, a large American force spent much of the summer of 1814 attempting to recapture this valuable Great Lakes outpost.

This presentation will discuss the planning and execution of this mission as well as its impact upon the lives of the American, British, Canadian, and Native American participants and the communities they called home.

A brief meeting and elections will take place prior to his talk. The program is open to the public and refreshments will be provided. Please enter by the front door.

Sault Naturalists Club Hosts Kirtland's Warbler Management in the U.P. Program at Bayliss Public Library

On March 11, at 7 p.m., the Sault Naturalists Club of Ontario and Michigan will host a free public program at Bayliss Public Library.

Steve Sjogren, Wildlife Biologist, Hiawatha National Forest, St. Ignace Ranger District, will discuss "Kirtland's Warbler Management in the U.P." The Kirtland's Warbler was listed as endangered under the Endangered Species Act of 1973.

Mr. Sjogren has been a member of the Kirtland's Warbler Recovery Team for most of his 30+ year career with the Forest Service. He is responsible for wildlife management in the East Unit of the Hiawatha National Forest, including 60,000 acres of the Racó Plains, which held 15 singing Kirtland's Warblers last June.

In 1993, he discovered one bird north of Man-

istique, which launched an intensive management program. The population in the U.P. has grown steadily, with 31 singing males counted this year.

He will use the Racó Plains example to illustrate an ecosystem management strategy that benefits not only the Kirtland's Warbler, but also sharp-tailed grouse and other species that are adapted to fire.

Less Hectic Pace at Drummond Island Library

Drummond Island Library has settled into a less hectic schedule since our summer residents and patrons have transported themselves to a warmer climate. Despite our six-foot drifts of snow in January and February, we continued to see many patrons utilizing the computers and acquiring movies, jigsaw puzzles, and reading material to snuggle in with while sitting by a warm fire.

Our Friends Group doesn't reconvene until May so our scheduled activities are on hiatus.

However, since our library is attached to the elementary school, we see daily visits from the students, who are busy reading "fun" books and chapter books for test purposes.

In March, we plan to have "Library Reading Month," where a parent volunteer will weekly read a book on libraries to a group of students. Some of the titles we will be reading are: *The Librarian from the Black Lagoon*, *The Library Ghost*, *We're Going on a Book Hunt*, *Penelope*

Popper, *Book Doctor*, *Goldsocks and the Three Librarians*, *The Library Pages*, *Too Much Noise in the Library*, *The Library Gingerbread Man*, *Our Librarian Won't Tell Us Anything*, *Fire Up with Reading*, *The Library Doors*, and *Comin' Down to Storytime*.

Even though springtime is a few weeks away, we tell our patrons that books may transport them to any season around the world.

"Vision and Learning" Program at Bayliss Public Library

Dr. Dale Johnson will speak to parents and educators at Bayliss Public Library on Tuesday, April 29, about "Vision and Learning." Dr. Johnson is a developmental optometrist, who practices at EUP Vision Therapy in Sault Ste. Marie.

Dr. Johnson states, "Vision problems can have a profound effect on how we learn. Many children who experience academic difficulty may have a visual dysfunction in addition to their primary reading or learning dysfunction. These con-

ditions are treatable."

The free program will be held from 7-8 p.m. in the Community Room at Bayliss Public Library.

"Pushing the Limits" Science Program at Pickford Community Library

"Pushing the Limits" of the World as We've Known It: Science as Part of Our Daily Lives" is a reading, reviewing, and discussion program for adults in rural communities, made possible by a grant awarded to Pickford Community Library from the National Science Foundation through the Califa Group.

Science awareness is crucial to engaging with

today's world in a meaningful and informed manner. This program is designed to provoke curiosity by using popular fiction—not heavy scientific textbooks—as a launching point for videos and discussions in a hybrid science café/book club format.

The presentations are organized around four themes: knowledge, nature, survival, and con-

nection. Each theme provides a background for showing the story of mankind as a history of people pushing the limits of their abilities and the world around them: a journey through the science of our daily lives.

The program will begin on April 29, and continues on the fourth Thursday of May, June, and July.
