Congratulations to the Friends of Bayliss Public Library for winning the 2013 “Outstanding Friends Group” award! The award is presented annually by the Friends of Michigan Libraries, a statewide organization that supports and assists local Friends groups throughout Michigan.

The Friends of Bayliss Library received the award in the category of groups serving a population of 12,000 and higher and based on the

scope of the Friends activities in 2013.

Friends of Michigan Libraries President Paul Miller presented the award to Andrea Masters, president of the Friends of Bayliss Library, at the annual meeting and workshop of the Friends of Michigan Libraries in Canton, Michigan, on April 3, 2014. The award includes a plaque and a monetary grant of \$400. Look for the plaque on display at the Circula-

tion Desk at Bayliss Public Library!

The Friends of Bayliss Library group was established in 1991. Today, it has 183 members and 15 board members.

In 2013, the Friends raised over \$6,000 for children’s programming and the purchase of items such as large print books, audio books, and archival materials for Bayliss Public Library. In the last 15 years, the Friends have donated almost \$60,000.

Spring Storytime at **Curtis Library** is bringing robins, bugs, and blooms to town. All books and crafts have a spring theme. We've made robins and ladybugs so far—frogs and leaves are coming soon! Spring Storytime will run through May 15 on Thursdays at 11 a.m.

By June 19 we should have sufficient sunshine and warmth for Summer Reading to begin. Jeanne King is coordinating the Summer Reading Program again this summer. Special programs will include "Bubbles" with the Ann Arbor Hands-on Museum and biology programs by the Seney National Wildlife Refuge.

Summer Reading Programs will be held Thursdays at 11 a.m., from June 19 through July 24. Children of all ages are welcome.

"Explore" **Les Cheneaux Community Library**, an ongoing program, is bringing young children and their parents into the library.

Participants register and pick up a scavenger hunt sheet to be completed at their leisure. They get to read books on the big stuffed dog, make a copy of their hand, find 12 stars, and talk about the many interesting parts of the library. There is a good number of copied hand prints on the windows of the conference room, where patrons enter the library. We plan on continuing the program for our summer residents, visitors, and all of our patrons through August.


ley Cat Adventure. Ms. Preston and Floyd will also meet with the Support Group for the Visually Impaired in the Community Room at 6 p.m.

Superior Poetry Café at Bayliss Public Library

Bayliss Library's next Superior Poetry Café will be held on June 12, at 7 p.m. Murray Lamothe, of Sault Ste. Marie, Ontario, will be the featured poet.

After serving with the Police Service for 33 years, Murray attended Algoma/Laurentian University receiving his B.A. degree in Political Science in 2006. The experience fostered an interest in creative writing. The following summer, Murray attended the Hallibur-

ton School of Fine Arts creative writing program in Ontario. Encouraged to push the limits of his writing, he returned to the Sault to enroll in studies under Dr. Alana Bondar.

In 2013 Murray temporarily set his short story and poetry aside to fulfill a 20-year dream. His soon-to-be-released book, *Lanyard*, tells the story of his final homicide investigation into the long-forgotten murder of a high school teen in Sault,

Ontario, on October 18, 1945.

At the Poetry Café, Murray will share excerpts from his book as well as a mix of poetry, including a reading from the Johnny Bakker file (his characterization of his fictional character—Johnny Bakker: age 108—"the last survivor of WWI").

Bring your own writing, stories, and music to share at the open mic.

Our area has just experienced one of the coldest, snowiest winters in a long time. “Pushing the Limits” at Pickford Community Library

The Pickford Community Library is hosting the reading, video, and discussion series “Pushing the Limits.” This series explores science as part of our daily lives with works of fiction under four themes: knowledge, connection, survival, and nature. The series is made possible by a grant from the National Science Foundation through the Califa Group.

We interact with science and technology daily, sometimes with ease, and sometimes with confusion or frustration. The books in this series give readers a chance to ex-

plore human origins, traditions, and our changing understanding of the natural world—and of human nature itself—all as a part of scientific tradition.

The novels represent a variety of genres (science fiction, mystery, adventure, and drama), all demonstrating people pushing the limits of their abilities and the world around them.

The “Pushing the Limits” program will be complemented by workshops and movie viewings on a variety of topics such as internet use, forestry, public safety, wildlife management, and modern

genealogy.

The reading program schedule is as follows: May 13—*The Hitchhiker’s Guide to the Galaxy* by Douglas Adams (theme: knowledge), May 27—*Thunderstruck* by Erik Larson (theme: connection), June 10—*Arctic Drift* by Clive Cussler (theme: survival), and July 1—*When the Killing’s Done* by T.K. Boyle (theme: nature).

The library will be open during this construction. For part of the time our parking lot will be available



while the crew works on the north end of the street by Dawson Street. When they move to the other end of the street, visitors to the library will need to park in one of the public parking lots and enter the library by the Dawson Street entrance.

Included in the construction plans are new sidewalks along Library Drive.

In addition, beginning May 14, Dawson Street between Ashmun Street and Bingham Avenue will permanently become a two-way street.
